Hebrews 4:15 (Specifically our "weaknesses" related to our <i>relationship with God</i>)	
Now: NOTICE SOMETHING about this sympathy of Jesus, the Son of God. Notice a detail. A "small something."Q."Why trouble ourselves with details?")A.It is ALWAYS WORTHWHILE to trouble ourselves with small Bible details.	
"Small detail #116" → This important additional character trait is mentioned as a double negative.	
Hebrews 4:15 For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses	
It is TRUE: a double negative = a positive. "I can'	t do nothin' about it" means we CAN do something!
 Q. But why is <u>THE SYMPATHY OF CHRIST</u> stated as a double negative? WHY NOT: "We HAVE a high priest who CAN sympathize with our weaknesses"? A. BECAUSE OF ANOTHER "SMALL DETAIL" 	
Hebrews 4:15 For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who <u>in every</u> respect has been tempted as we are	
???→ Jesus, the Son of God has been tempted "in every respect" "as we are" REALLY? As someone who has plunged deep into pornography? As someone who has developed a severe drug addiction? As someone with a severe anger management issue?	

As someone with a severe inferiority complex?

As someone damaged by a deep root of bitterness?

 \rightarrow THAT would be **MORE** than we **MIGHT** hope for! THAT would "seem to" offer us more comfort than is available.

WHAT WE MUST HOLD FAST

2. We must understand that Jesus is not completely like us in our weaknesses.

Hebrews 4:15 TWO OTHER SMALL DETAILS For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, <u>yet without sin.</u>

- a) It doesn't say: *"without sinning.*"
- [Both are true but the 2nd is what it says.]
- b) The Greek original doesn't say "<u>yet without sin</u>".
 [Both are true but the 2nd is what it says.]

John 14:30-31 I will no longer talk much with you, for the ruler of this world is coming. <u>He has no claim on me,</u> [*lit.* he was nothing in me] but I do as the Father has commanded me, so that the world may know that I love the Father...

→ Because our problem is WITH GOD. We need A MEDIATOR, but we also need A SACRIFICE.

→ If Christ's temptations, trials, testings WERE absolutely like ours, so that he was absolutely sympathetic, he would NOT be an acceptable sacrifice for sin.

Like every other high priest, he would NEED a perfect sacrifice for all of his own sins. (Compare 5:1,2)

WE NEED a sympathetic mediator (high priest.) But do WE WANT sympathy more than help?

Do we want sympathy MORE than a solution? (DO WE LOVE OURSELVES MORE THAN WE LOVE GOD?)

WHAT WE MUST HOLD FAST

3. We must believe in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Hebrews 4:16 Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

Mercy = undeserved kindness to help a person in need.

Grace = underserved kindness to a person who deserves the opposite: punishment.

NO NEED TO WORRY! **The confidence** we gain from the sympathy of Christ is **enough confidence** to draw near to God. GOD is sitting on a throne of grace --- and Jesus, the Son of God, is seated AT HIS RIGHT HAND.

2 Corinthians 8:9 For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich.

Jesus, the Son of God, our great high priest, is MERCIFUL **AND** SYMPATHETIC.

→ He does **NOT KNOW** BY EXPERIENCE what it is like to deserve punishment for our weaknesses. → But he **DOES KNOW** what the punishment feels like.

+ SO WHAT ABOUT THOSE WEAKNESSES OF OURS WE NEED HELP WITH?

WHAT IF OUR WEAKNESSES INCLUDE

~ a pornography habit? ~ a violent temper?

~ a drug dependency?

~ years of bitterness? ~ many failures?

~ moral weaknesses?

We are the people needing help? We know of someone with the help we need? What if we know a few things about him? ~ MERCIFUL. FAITHFUL. "NOT UNABLE" TO SYMPATHIZE. Hebrews 4:16 Let us then with confidence draw near to <u>the throne of grace</u>, that we may receive mercy <u>and find grace</u> to help in time of need.

And how much more: if the help we need is not a result of our careless living, or our deliberate wrong-doing, but rather a result of our careful living, and our intentional right-doing? → VIDEO TESTIMONY
