The book of Judges is a mirror. Block: "No book in the Old Testament offers the modern reader church a telling a mirror as this book." The book of Judges deals with harsh realities which result in the realization the "there was no king."

This has been a week of harsh realities. The events have brought life into perspective, a perspective that our culture often leaves us unaware of. However, unlike the book of judges, this week's events and the painful realities have revealed to us, "There is a King"

I'd like to share with you some things that I have been witness to in regards to this difficult episode in the life of the Ngabwe family and in our lives as well.

The Need for a King

Throughout the book of Judges we see the downward spiralling of God's people. The religious, moral, and social degradation is a significant theme of the book. It is clear that this degraded existence is a result of their own lack of faithfulness; everyone did what was right in their own eyes is the refrain that is tagged on to the declaration "there was no king."

And,

"There was no king" is the theological commentary of the author. As the author has relayed the stories of the Judges and failing of God's people, he clearly implies that if Israel has a king, things wouldn't be this way.

As you follow the biblical narrative, you come to realize—in the books of Samuel, Kings, and Chronicles—that eventually Israel has kings. And, ultimately, this didn't turn out any different. God's people still fell from faithfulness and continually betrayed their God. Was the author of Judges wrong in implying that Israel needed a king? No. However, what the continued story of Israel indicates in that God's people need a certain kind of king. In fact, they need a king who is greater than all of their problems. They need a powerful king who could overcome their own weaknesses and failings. The need a "capital K" king.

The story of the Bible informs us that the great king they needed eventually came. And his greatness was found in the fact that he was not only a man, but that he was God himself. And King Jesus lived among his people. And he showed his people how to live in perfect faithfulness to God. And in his perfect faithfulness to God he was obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. King Jesus died for his people, in their place. He died to save them from sin, and their sins, and the punishment those sins require. He showed his kingly greatness by his death which brought them forgives, and reconciled them to their God who adopted them into his family. And perhaps he showed his greatness in the most powerful way by also defeating death. After dying, King Jesus rose from the dead.

The horrendous events in the time of the Judges left God's people with a profound sense of the absence of a great king who could help them. The tragic events of the past week have left me with a profound sense of the presence of a great king who has saved us, is saving us, and will save us. I would like to share with you a bit of what I have witnessed that has left me wondering where the king was, but convinced of the King's presence in the lives of his people.
