Christ came to be a savior; a suffering servant not a Caesar.

Christ did not come to initiate a worldly kingdom but a spiritual kingdom.

Great Expectations

The Jewish nation's expectations of Jesus:

- A MESSIAH who would inaugurate the KINGDOM of GOD
- Messiah = King who would deliver God's people, judge the wicked, and usher in God's kingdom; Kingdom of God = a realm over which God reigns, bringing blessing, prosperity, and restoration
- 1. Bring victory military
- 2. Bring peace political
- 3. Bring prosperity social/economic

The Jewish nation had GREAT EXPECTATIONS for a SAVIOUR who would be a new CAESAR.

Grave Expectations

John 12:27-34 (ESV)

Jesus' expectations of himself:

- 1. Jesus would bring victory over their spiritual enemies Colossians 1:16 (ESV)
- 2. Jesus would bring spiritual peace Colossians 1:19-22 (ESV)
- 3. Jesus would bring spiritual prosperity Colossians 2:9-10 (ESV)

Jesus had GRAVE EXPECTATIONS that to be the SAVIOUR he must be the SUFFERING SERVANT.

Isaiah 52:13 - 52:12 (ESV)

Grateful Expectations

Our expectations of Jesus in the lives we live now:

Are we expecting a SAVIOUR who will:

- 1. Free from trials John 15:18-20 (ESV), 1 Peter 4:12-14 (ESV)
- 2. Relational peace Matthew 10:34-39 (ESV)
- 3. Economic prosperity Mark 8:34-37

1 Peter 3:18 (ESV)

Our GRATEFUL EXPECTATION should be that our SAVIOUR brings us to God.
